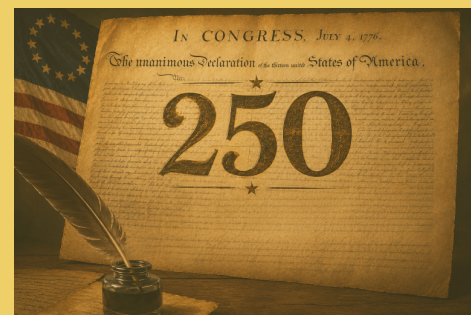

This colloquium brings together two scholars working — from and with divergent yet resonant spatial perspectives and archives — on the significance of cultural-political narratives and the superpower-efforts that went into constructing and consolidating them in the aftermath of WWII. Though the focus will be on US-American approaches and theatres of action — North America and South and Southeast Asia — during the Early Cold War (1948-68), the way in which Soviet cultural-political outreaches — especially to the Global South (called the “Third World“ back then) — caused dramatic shifts in US policy-positions will also be foregrounded. From the twists and turns in the legislative debates in the Internal Security Act (modeled after Japanese American wartime incarceration) to the reinvention of Bali as a tourists’ *Shangri-la* after the ruthless and bloody anti-Communist massacres there by Gen. Suharto’s soldiers and local militias in 1965, the “Red Scare” was a major catalyst of American geopolitical machinations in the said period. The two papers will seek to contextualise this from the prisms of discourse analysis and global microhistory, along with other methodological approaches.
